

THE HAYWOOD RANCH, often referred to as the former President's most prized acquisition, includes a summer home and boat docks.

The ranch was purchased by Moursund and then-Vice President Johnson in 1961 from Texas Christian University, which had received it in the will of the late Mrs. Lula Haywood.

Moursund and Mr. Johnson paid TCU \$200,000 in cash plus a \$300,000 note, at 5 per cent interest, payable in full on June 8, 1971. TUC filed an acknowledgement July 30 that the debt has been completely paid off.

THE 214 LOTS Mr. Johnson received as part of the agreement were in four lakefront subdivisions - Comanche Rancherías Units 1 and 2, Comanche Ranchettes Unit 2 and Lakewood Forest Unit 2.

The subdivisions have been developed by the Comanche Cattle Corp., which Moursund heads. A telephone operator in Kingsland said Friday the firm's phone had recently been disconnected.

The "rancherías," which front on Lake LBJ, average about 60 feet by 220 feet in size and were last known to sell for about \$6,500 each, or around \$26,000 an acre.

The "ranchettes," which are farther from the shoreline, average 300 feet by 400 feet and sell for about \$7,000 a piece, or around \$2,300 an acre.

THE POST learned from reliable sources that cowboys on the Haywood and Nicholson ranches have been instructed to carefully separate incoming livestock to make sure they are marked with new cattle brands.

No new brands have yet been filed with the Llano County clerk's office, however.
